era too, so that you'll have the photos to help you recall details.

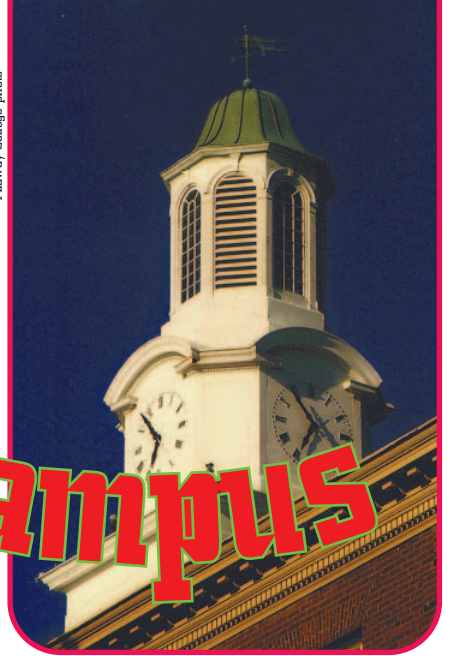
And, remember to ask for business cards during your visit so that you'll have direct phone numbers and addresses in case you get home and think of questions you forgot to ask.
